Stanek said unknown but the number keeps going down - EGLE wants them to see if they can locate buildings in a manner that they don't take up wetlands. Unsure of amounts - never divided between ours and Green Twp. Looking for additional amounts of land to transfer wetlands to.

No knowledge of asking for the animal shelter/pioneer to sell? - Currie

The Right Place realtor working on it - Stanek

Bill says he has talked to their broker and knows they have tried to "land in green".

Currie - concerned that if they can't make it go on parcels that they will move west looking for wetlands. I'd like the information on that.

Bill - working with EGLE real close.

A motion was made by Currie to approve of the consent agenda. Supported by Everett. Motion passed unanimously.

#### **UNFINISHED BUSINESS:**

1. **Wal-Mart Tax Appeal:** Tax trib results stand as given unless we'd like to appeal them, but it wasn't recommended. No action taken.
2. **Par Plan Grant:** A motion was made by Saez to approve of the Par Plan Grant amount awarded in the amount of \$1,377. Supported by Currie with a suggestion to order cameras in March and add to the agenda.

#### **NEW BUSINESS:**

1. **Recommendation to add Bob Szykowski to ZBA:** A motion was made by Currie to approve of the addition of Bob Szykowski to the ZBA. Supported by Saez.
2. **Brining of Gravel Roads:** A motion was made by Saez to approve of the MCRC 2023 Dust Control for 2 applications at \$140 per mile. Supported by Everett. Motion passed unanimously on a roll call vote.
3. **Recommendation to add Rachel Snyder to Fire Roster:** A motion was made by Everett to approve of the addition of Rachel Snyder to the BRT FD. Supported by Saez.
4. **Recommendation to add Noah Silk to Fire Roster:** A motion was made by Everett to approve of the addition of Noah Silk to the BRT FD. Supported by Currie.
5. **Fire Department DNR Grant:** A motion was made by Currie to accept the DNR 2023 Grant match of \$1,025.00. Supported by Everett. Motion passed unanimously on a roll call vote.
6. **Mecosta Conservation District Hazardous Waste Collection:** A motion was made by Currie to approve of a contract with the Mecosta County Conservation District for the Hazardous waste collection in the amount of \$3,000 for 2023. Supported by Saez. Motion passed unanimously on a roll call vote.
7. **Iltis Bill:** Currie - on Iltis bill - question with additional ceiling tiles/stonework etc. No excuse for money to be spent twice to redo the project. A motion was made by Currie to approve of the Iltis Construction bill in the amount of \$55,045.35 noting a difference between the additional first bill of \$26,117.60 being \$31,162.95 over what was approved from the original \$50,000. Supported by Everett. Motion passed 4-1. Stanek, no. (There was a remaining amount to be spent with first motion of \$145,000 to renovate using ARPA funds, but the Township should have stopped the work being done to the building before it got to the point it was from the original renovation.)

#### **Financial**

1. **Payroll:** A motion was made by Currie to approve of Payroll in the amount of \$22,972.10. Supported by Everett. Motion passed unanimously on a roll call vote.
2. **Accounts Payable:** A motion was made by Currie to approve of Accounts Payables in the amount of \$116,043.12, less the 30% deposit reimbursed from Ayers Basement. Supported by Everett. Motion passed unanimously on a roll call vote.

**PUBLIC COMMENT:** Patti Downey- There have been a lot of special meetings - only 18 hours' notice for a special meeting granted most have been in the middle of the day - I think we need to get the word out to check the website - check daily on special meetings. A lot of good discussion in those meetings. Also related - is there any kind of mechanism for when the public comes - and you go into closed session. How can we know when we are able to return when it's back in open session?

Currie - I can answer that question. We should have moved to a different room, we could have very easily gone to the break room and come back. We should do that in the future.

Jerry - On the public meeting next **Monday, February 13th in the County Services Building at 7pm**. Guest speakers with experience in economic development community and corporations.

Patti - Was there a deadline on surveys and timeframe?

Saez - We didn't set one, evaluating results currently and plan to present in future. 2,800 were sent out to registered voters in Township, probably around 1,000 received back. We are deciding on the best way to evaluate the responses. People either strongly for it or strongly against it.

Currie - There will be a small presentation on the company's origin - feel very strongly that if this community cannot agree on the origin, how will we ever get the important questions revolving around environmental responsibility answered. So that people can trust us that we have the proper answers.

**NEW BUSINESS:**

\*Explanation for why we're waiting for public comment until after our two guests have spoken. \*

**1. Michael LaFaive presentation**

Michael LaFaive is senior director of fiscal policy for the Mackinac Center for Public Policy, where he has worked for more than 27 years. He is the author of hundreds of essays, opposite editorials, blog posts and more than a dozen studies on fiscal policy topics, including those on state and local economic development incentive programs. His 2020 study, titled "Economic Development? State Handouts and Jobs: A New Look at the Evidence," examined more than 2,300 state incentive deals across nine program or program areas in Michigan back to 1983.

Michael speaking - This subject is on a lot of minds because of the prospective Gotion plant and incentives that come along with it. Let's discuss Michigan specific operations. Fiscal incentives to have a company perform/industry.

Key economic/other findings on incentive programs. States and programs approve tens of billions of dollars each year. Studies show that they are ineffective at raising economic growth in an area (on net balance). The money is used to incentivize other industries - why many have failed. Common arguments made - alternative strategies adopted in the area. Many incentive programs over the years - first of modern era Mississippi - hope of alleviating unemployment during the great depression. Academics across the country have had time to dig into these programs and provide studies.

University of Iowa - categorized the studies - conclusion - the failure of economic development incentives. Concluded the most fundamental problem - most officials believe they can influence their audience beyond most optimistic results.

A 2019 study grabbed a database of economic development deals from 35 states - 2400 deals able to track employment at firms after deals had been struck - to show whether or not employment would increase. Concluded - starkly negative employment impact between subsidies for big business. Like unsubsidized companies had faster rates of employment growth.

With 2300 incentive deals specific to Michigan, in 5 program areas with 0 impact. Couldn't measure in pos/or neg way. In 1 category findings were negative - employment dropped. In 3 categories positive impact. Incentives were so large to create a job that it made the cost outweigh the benefits.

The state had to offer 125k per year per job in incentives. Cost > benefits. Highest profile program - one area where we found no jobs impact was w/ respect to ren zones. Looked at about 4 companies. 2005-2016 4 other MI specific ren zone studies done by MI people - 0 to negative impact from programs. 2005 study grad @ western MI - zones not much impact at all in employment except for small firms. Net decline in wages associated with the ren zone - MSU study not positive

Lansing - instead of ren zones - same amount of incentives but rolled back business tax by equal amount. Would have been a better approach and 12k more jobs would have been developed.

MI spec studies - targeted tax abatements. MSU economist /Wayne state looked @ targeted abatements in industry. Found that local gov that did not abate, was as likely to experience growth as those that did.

Programs found to be ineffective - Government involved in transfer of wealth more than creation of new wealth. Hard to hope that things will win economically than if left untouched.

Frequently new jobs created and reported by state don't subtract for workers that were pulled from existing employers in the area. Imposes real cost on the economy. Movement must be up in terms of benefits. Could impose job killing. Mega issues and states will trumpet them - same company asking for amendment to deal because economy was so good that they couldn't find employees to fill jobs and receive credits for tax deals.

State uses the "but for" argument - this company would have never come - 75-98% of relocations by companies would have happened without the incentive. Up to 98% of these deals result in windfall profit for companies at taxpayer's cost. Legislation - state compact to pass legislation to all eliminate incentives at same time. The bill was buried in committee.

Alternatives? Mundane. High quality/more public services. Looked at many things linked between economic areas. Most positives involved general government and public safety. The factors most consistent are investments in the downtown and spending on basic local public services.

## 2. **John Mozena Presentation**

John Mozena is the president of the Center for Economic Accountability, which is a nonpartisan group that works for transparency, accountability and market-based reforms of state and local economic development programs across America. Over the past two years, he's been quoted in the media around the country at least once a week on average talking about economic development policy issues. He's also been on both sides of this discussion, as before he got into public policy, he spent 20 years in private-sector roles that put him behind the scenes of economic development deals, including projects like subsidized battery factories and auto suppliers.

John speaking - Lots of people here. This is a sign of a community that people care about - what matters from an economic development perspective - was at a conference last year - researcher that presented about whether or not a rural area - is it a place people care about and are proud of living? I'm not an economist. I talk to them so you don't have to.

Short supply around this project - in terms of context, wanted to offer what we could. Evidence that deals don't work on a general level. If they don't work, why do we keep doing them?

One The hard truth at the end of the day they don't exist to create jobs - they exist to make people think that politicians create jobs. 55% of Americans believe that subsidies pull other jobs. You don't have to read the studies to understand that this doesn't work - you just have to pay attention. Politicians may have good intentions, but still fall prey to inability to make a better decision than the market process. If they were able to figure out which companies and technologies were able to be successful, they wouldn't be making civil servants in Lansing - they'd be making billions on wall street.

Let's assume that this time they get it right. That everything promised will work. What does that look like? North Star's goal is to create 100k jobs over 5 years. How many workers in the State of MI? 4.9 million - about half the population of the state in the workforce. Imagine the economy is a football stadium full of fans. Adding 100k is equivalent to 125 fans at FSU stadium. 2200 at UofM. Not "nothing" but anyone that spends time around football knows that things will fluctuate by multiple factors. Just like an economy where 100k jobs isn't "nothing" but the state's economy is going to fluctuate by way more than that by all given factors. That's only if we ignore all research and studies revolving around these incentives.

You cannot talk about economics because they don't change strategy based on economics. Evidence - why do states see large jumps in subsidized deals? Governors running for re-election are twice as likely to see an increase in these deals.

A 9% shift by voters will win you a lot of elections. We don't talk about downsize, negative impacts of messing with an economy like this. More on subsidies less on roads/schools. Less entrepreneurship. Cheaper to hire lobbyist's than scientists. Billions of dollars ripe for public corruption. Cultural environment of secret sales.

We stopped at MI strategic fund meeting and within a half hour and only me with public comment - State found out on Friday, voted on today - last year testified to MI state senate's economic development committee - to be blunt these bills will have to be practical 32.30 - next day email from MEDC staffer - nothing you said was incorrect, I don't find it offensive to call the soar fund what it is. People care about making the place they live a better place to live. Officials who don't care and some who do. Happening to the community not for the community in my opinion. Grateful for all to be here.

Questions from the board members:

Everett - Commonly asked by the public, if money is there why don't we take it?

Answer: No such thing as a free lunch. Going to cost someone something, some way. If a company needs to find employees - might go to your business and recruit one of your employees that you trained to work for them. Certainly, one that affects you and the local economy and larger state. Always the real risk that it doesn't work out.

A lot of people are familiar with Foxconn. Famous case that allowed for them - the project never got built. The Supreme Court said you can take someone's house away from them for economic development. Almost more uncommon for a project to go off unlike supposed to but a lot of risk. This project - however it gets funded, would impose costs on the community, also benefits. But the question is on a free lunch - paying their own way as everyone else without the cost incentives.

Mega program - only 2.3% of jobs promised came to fruition in a basic economy. Might have created jobs but only 2.3 of deals where jobs were delivered in the time frame that had been promised.

**Currie** - in one of the analogies - unfunded companies grow faster than companies with incentives?

**Answer** - this is a fact drawn from a study called striking a balance. The bigger the company was the more starkly, negative impacts. Suggestion John has seen - if a company has a business decision changed by subsidy, not going to the best place to do business. Ford's now doing business in the second-best place (Unapproved by the Governor in Virginia).

Each year they are surveying on where to put factories etc. Every year local incentives come in 8-12th, way below skilled workforce ability, energy costs/availability. Really fundamental questions on deciding where to do business.

**Currie** - Also mentioned companies that get incentive and for whatever reason not able to live up to obligations because they can't fulfill. Where do funds go?

**Answer** - Back to MSF. A large number of companies ask that deals be amended. Claw backs are lenient - They never get to that stage and the company sees it coming before it happens.

**Saez** - A large divide currently amongst the community - this will create so many local jobs but from the get-go they've announced this study in regards to this 50-60-mile radius that they plan to fill employment with - can you expand on those studies/claims?

**Answer**- Very possible jobs may come from outside of the community but other employers may face the same cost, outside of the area. The state used to mandate that there be a report of where the workers came from because of this exact question. Data stopped appearing. Employees were not coming from out of state - being taken very locally. Can't predict where they will take it from but reports by those seeking incentives are often prepared before seeking incentives so they have some type of form showing positive benefits. Cheaper to subsidize someone rare than to find a bunch of skilled workers sitting unemployed. Not hiring off of unemployment, hiring those from different employers.

**Saez** - Follow up - another impact on Increase enrollment/retention in the area with FSU? Seem to know about many studies - any knowledge on that?

**Answer** - No evidence right away - one cautionary tale - Foxconn promised \$10 million to the community. A relation to workforce and skilled development - Amazon ended up where they are with a relationship with tech colleges and communities there. Interesting question to look into more

**Saez** - Recently another person raised a point to me recently - there are some good things to come from these subsidies, for example, other companies having to raise their wages to compete. Do you see that often in these studies or possibly alternative - factories shutting down or relocating?

**Answer** - There is going to be an Economic relationship - dynamic between a plant that shows up and moves to hire other workers. I don't know if I often see a movement upward for all of the local employers. Failure to do so but specific instances that don't apply because overall salaries were lower. Would need a lot more data and time to analyze.



**Public comment:**

**Mark Bloxon** - Big Rapids - listened tonight and I've heard one side. If transparency means anything I believe there would be someone here with opposite views. Why not make it objective.

**Answer** - There have been those meetings - FSU, the right place. This is an open public meeting. Anyone welcome.

**Fred Guenther** - In 90's Hayworth put together package - Mackinac center put together package - success story that you didn't mention. Do these analyses of one company at a time - much better off if the free market made decisions.

**Answer** - At least ¾ of the time companies would have done the exact same thing without the incentives. Just because factories were built does not mean subsidies are what did it.

**Brad Austin?** - Reed City - isn't this true if this plant doesn't locate here, isn't it going to be in another state? If claw back is a problem, then maybe we should have some really harsh claw back rates. What's the multiplier rate?

**Answer** - There are negative multipliers too. 3.1 is the multiplier - research says you should be careful of

**Lee Johnson** - Big Rapids - begs the question - can we say no to the subsidy and still ask them to come?

**Answer** - There's an example of how the local government must have contributed to that incentive package. Local government said no and they located in the same location anyway - great example of that - Amazon and HQ2 - great example for how little subsidies matter. Amazon is a great example on not taking subsidy. In New York but then went on to purchase a large building - didn't take subsidy because they didn't want politicians to have that leverage over them.

**Deborah Diegert** - Doesn't government far exceed any other business. It does not produce money - takes money. Michigan is desperate - our state needs income. Having the tentacles of a state controlled and in the hands of communist ties. The mining/child labor/lithium is so heavy. Farming community is not set up to handle this.

**Tim Blakeman** - FSU grad - Guenther I know you want what's best for the community - but we do have an example that went haywire and that's Ice Mountain. Everything was going to be great. Wells started going dry - 60 jobs offered when 350 were promised. Piping water in from other locations.

**Chuck Healey** from BR - Parallel situation happened with A123 systems that was also a battery manufacturer - that situation failed and Granholm was asked how much money was paid to mega through that and her response was that there was secrecy involved and do those laws still exist?

**Answer** - there is a ban on secret deals coalition - made illegal at state level. The Mackinac center has taken the state to court over provisions. Adopted a handful of lawmakers that all signed NDA's and lawmakers themselves may not have known who/what deals were. Not until the day of approval did, we learn where the parent company was recently in Escanaba. Give the public time to absorb information before it takes place. Hurt many people in WI.

**Tracy Ruelle** - (to Everett) can you please clear up that MEDC has not been to the meetings - only the September meetings? We want questions to be directed to the presenters.

**Everett** - the MEDC is not here tonight. Confusion amongst many the transposition of MEDC/MCDC. Public meeting - we aren't required to make individual invitations.

**Tracy** - Isn't it true that when other businesses open up that those positions will be filled because other jobs open up other jobs. These incentives are the law of the land and whether or not BRT chooses to approve this, will it be spent somewhere else?

**Answer** - Each fund has to be signed off by the legislature/appropriations committee. There is no law requiring that just money in the soar fund will be spent. Every specific single fund must be approved. State legislature must vote to disburse funds.

**Unknown member of audience** - Is there a reason we keep talking about giving money when it isn't outright giving? Directly do they get a check?

**Answer** - the first part of the soar fund will cut a check to the company about 125 million (will double check that number) and the other 50 million through the right place. Haven't gotten money from taxes on property now so not giving up anything.

**Patti Downey** - Big Rapids - lots of different studies - where could I research studies - really curious about the Hayworth thing - hardly anyone there when I have tried to contact them - I'd like to do some more research. The MI strategic fund meetings - are those open to the public? How do I find them?

**Answer** - all studies can be provided by us after the meeting - lots of printouts on table. Mibusiness.org - MI strategic fund - by the time you get there it's just a vote and all the work is done beforehand. At risks of a little self-advertisement studies that I've referenced - links of all on economicaccountability.org MI strategic fund meetings on zoom - type in MI strategic fund board packets - will get agenda and all documents on deals. Most recent studies from 2020 - literature review with all studies and can provide if interested. Mackinac center has an old mega database. Used to publish on every single megadeal.

**Joseph Cella** - Appreciate economic context with how national security context might come into play - Calhoun County with CATL - has the board considered the standing national intelligence law in China that their subsidiaries here don't have to comply with? - to protect our national security - done to protect threats - in this case could be China. Anything come across - any petitions?

**Answer** - Michael - I have seen nothing but we focus on the economics of it, less concerned with where parent company might be than risk and costs.

**Response** - Aren't there economic costs related to national security?

**Answer** - Michael - we recognize it but we don't necessarily take it into consideration in studies.

**John Holsworth** - I share concerns but one that you may not know - MLIVE Jan 29th - cyber security program and accessing satellites - not just balloons. What kind of economic tragedy could that be?

**Answer** - Michael - a lot that could go wrong - not purview of our state-based tank.

**Deb Magnusen** - I am 4 miles from where Gotion may be - What will something like this do to small businesses in the community?

**Answer** - Depends on economic development incentives and the company itself. Small retails closing from larger firms coming to compete. Kogel? One of Flint's only growth industries. CEO hears state has given subsidy to move to MI to compete with him. Still a thriving company but he, like others, makes you wonder who you're working for when the State is trying to lure competition. One argument is - the competition is coming anyway - then why do you need to subsidize them? Fundamental unfairness that's not mentioned enough. General research - crowded out by bigger businesses.

**Joe Bechaz** - Hayworth, a part of the community for over 70 years. Also, a family-owned business. They did take over a factory that failed and received incentives - let the city take over property for those incentives. They left this town thousands of sewer and water bills. Can't go after them - how do they get the money back? Does it go to China? Because when they go, they're gone.

**Answer** - if the companies don't comply - MEDC claw back - 2 million dollars - firm went into bankruptcy - went back and hired CEO of biogenic and asked for \$\$ There was Hayworth op-ed in Detroit News not to create soar fund with Devos - against these deals.

**Tom White** - gist of this - you don't think we should incentivize this - we'd be glad to have you come but we don't want to give away incentives?

**Answer** - We could revoke ren zone/lease land - have discussed options but informed via MCDC that they would likely not be interested.

**Currie** - presenting information about Gotion ownership - As an elected official - I am disappointed in the actions of our supervisors - publicly stating that this is not a Chinese company - some have deceived our residents with the simplest answers. How can they trust we will get the rest right. Wasted so much time and energy trying to get this right. I would like to thank those for the comments, questions and answers.

One more question to ask the board - some new information has come to light. Would the board allow me to present it?

**Bean** - I move that we allow Penny to make her statement - Everett supports.

**Currie** - on Sept 15th of 2022, shortly after public announcement of the company interested here, and 7 days after asked to approve of the Ren zone, Biden authorized a committee to revise certain transactions by foreign purchases - in order to look into national security. Committee on foreign investments in the US - firstly have we done due diligence by a CFIUS review - if we have this executive order in place and we do not utilize it - why not? As American citizens our credibility is scrutinized when we try to purchase something, why isn't theirs?

**Bean** - I'd like to make a motion to request a special meeting to add that to the agenda - let's have a special meeting Wednesday to address this issue. Currie supports. Wednesday at 7pm.

**PUBLIC COMMENT:**

**Tom White** - I heard that BRT is still talking about Gotion and Green Twp has already okayed the project and if we don't okay it the project will likely move to Green Twp - we will still have traffic and possible pollution and other issues?

**Stanek** - they've said it's a go as far as I know. If we turn it down, they can do whatever they want.

**Tracy Ruelle** - reiterates statement and accuses it of being read wrong

**Currie** - document is online and everyone can read and interpret it how they want as Tracy has

**Brad Lubahn** - Have been to 3 meetings now - respect everyone here. We voted you all in as Twp Board to represent us- ask that you have closed meetings to only residents.

**Stanek** - will have to talk to attorney; don't believe we can.

**Unknown member of audience** - Worked for United Solar in Greenville. Then the Governor gave a great big subsidy to another company to make solar cells. United solar then closed up. - in the form of a question - Why is MI saying let's start a large company in batteries - will both succeed in MI when there is no lithium? Whether or not we want to take that risk?

**Lee Johnson** - Owns Johnson's automotive - biggest concerns about business is taking my employees - highly trained technicians that can work on anything - worry about Gotion coming in here and taking a handful of my guys that I've spent many years of my life training and getting them to speed. A lot came with training - if Gotion was here and if the job looked easier, they would walk. Very concerned about that. Not able to train people after people. Spent almost 20 years building a company. Business has been successful for me - umpteen number of hours. When you hand out subsidies like this - they don't need to hire what they said they needed to hire.

**Unknown member of audience** - Curious about Battery facilities being built in proposal - 7 of them in metro Detroit - 10 in Canada, none up here. Report made Feb 4th 2023 - proposals go down Mississippi river - obvious reasons. Kentucky building one right now. Question - is MIT studying this? Only way this will work is if they figure out how to replenish batteries once gone - other options for nickel/lithium for batteries. One plant in the US - in UTAH - not confirmed - How do we fit in here with getting supplies that other places are building - they do it for Ford/big 3. How will we compete?

**Mel Schneider** - The thing that scares me is to put the responsibility on the board to make that decision - scares me worse - only 80 people in here. Another 10k to vote on something that they don't know anything about. Afraid of putting it out to the County/Twp to vote on something they don't know anything about. Stuck with whatever that vote is. A lot of really good comments. Maybe Lee Johnson should join in on a board to join in on such large decisions.

**Skylar Pipe** - BRT - concerns that if plant goes in about when it may go out - if that's being considered?

**Ladeanna Smalley** - Has any other company contacted our board or anybody in this area to see if they could possibly come here if Gotion does not come for a ren zone?

**Stanek** - at this point no.

**Judy Nelson** - We live right behind airport - many concerns with contamination - 2 new wells if something does go wrong ...

**Saez** - Updated list of questions formed with our attorney and engineer is on our website.

Wells/water/environmental concerns all listed. Any questions you don't see - please provide so we can include them.

**Bean** - first time questions provided directly to Gotion - never have had opportunity to sit down across the table from Gotion.

**Mark Watson** - correspondence - survey question? Lives in city and did not receive survey.

**Saez** - Explanation on why sent to Registered voters so that those with multiple parcels didn't receive multiple surveys. We include any correspondence we receive in our board packets. If you would like someone to reach out, we will.

**Todd McClain** - Why BR particular? Why chemical plant in Muskegon River watershed - huge watershed people - wolverine in Rockford - still dealing with mess - makes Flint look like tiny affair - wealthy area still suffering.

**Currie** - multiple states chosen - dwindled to be a finalist because of vote on Ren zone and large incentive package.

**Unknown** - Original intent for developing industrial park? To sell to a foreign country? Difficulty with that.

**Joe Bechaz** - on Twp board when we created ren zone - to bring quality jobs healthy for our community. There were incentives but nothing like this - not my term but they have turned down other businesses that might not have had criteria for it. Applaud board for doing due diligence - taxpayers - could be educated through some flyers/questions and answers.

**Unknown** - Gotion was specifically interested in wanting to be along waterways - apparent they want to be around waterways. Product to transport.

**Paul Griffith** - speaking as prior president of BR industrial development corporation - this evening we've heard about many incentives over the decades. One local example - Hayworth Proposed program; went to meeting - Hayworth impacts on community. Spoke of average of jobs.

**CALL TO ORDER: 7:00 p.m. ROLL CALL: Saez, Currie, Bean, Everett, Routley present. Geib, Stanek absent.**

**NEW BUSINESS:** Bean moved to have a meeting on 2/13 set for 2/15 at 7pm to discuss a potential CFIUS review. Currie supported and the motion passed unanimously.

Sept 15th executive order extension - Currie

Committee to review Foreign Investments in the United States - September 15th, shortly after announcement/before Ren Zone

Currie - Concerns: in the resolution in corporate minutes of Gotion - clearly noted Mr. Li was on a committee called peoples PPC - directed and supervised directly by PRC - suggesting direct ties. Another concern may seem trivial but I don't believe so - Michigan houses the Austin Gas Fields - single largest gas reservoir in the US. Additionally, Camp Grayling, just 70 miles North of us - currently 148000 acres of national guard training - largest in US - looking at an additional 162k acres to their camp - to conduct training and exercises that uses sophisticated communication systems.

I have information from a senator speaking with a congressman on Friday in regards to the feasibility of this review and if he thinks it's warranted.

There are so many similarities with Gotion/ CATL - hot off the wire - Speaker of the house for FL and announcing CFIUS review of licensing agreement between FORD and CATL.

Multitude of things could happen - they could reject/approve the review and give a negative or a positive result.

Everett - Main complaint has been a lack of info so this would be responsible to allow someone more qualified to look into.

Bean - Board getting heat for research it's doing - think it's biased - but a lot of info passed on. All the good stuff has been said, nothing is questioned and it's our duty to question - We are buying the "car facts" and I commend each of you. We need to make sure we do it right, because if we are wrong it could be catastrophic for the community.

Currie - Question if this met criteria of CFIUS review - did read over executive order - there are some key elements that say it does meet criteria such as:

- Use of lithium and rare earth elements,

Saez - shared text on how automakers had to make sure vehicles were free of conflict materials such as tin and tungsten

Bean - Unsure if cobalt is a conflict material

Schraver - Timeline on that? Confliction with Gotion's plans if filing a CFIUS review?

Currie - A review is typically done within 45 days. Unsure if this board - Again only speaking for myself - is comfortable moving forward without a review.

Bean - Cost for transaction less than 5 million - only \$750.

Currie - I feel it is really important to note that if the speaker of the house and Senator from FL feels it's important to do a CFIUS review on CATL - what makes this project any different? Still meets criteria.

**Currie - I motion that BRT contracts with our attorney Mika Meyers to submit an immediate request of CFIUS in regards to the Chinese company Gotion in Big Rapids MI, Mecosta County. Included in the request should be the Gotion shareholder minute meetings from 1/18/23, the Gotion Resolution of the Shareholder Meeting, suggesting ties to CCP, the complete Ren Zone Application, Incentive Package, Senator Rubio's request to the White House dated 2/14/23, documentation in regard to MI having the most underground natural gas storage in the US, and Camp Grayling, the largest National Guard facility in the US that uses sophisticated communication systems, and any other information relevant and required by the CFIUS. Everett supports. Motion passed unanimously.**

Routley - Not sure if it falls within the motion, but what type of background info did the state do?

Jerry Garner - Have you checked with the state?

Saez - Randy Thelen with MCDC relaying that the state did their approval process at one of our December meetings, unknown what that process consisted of, no details or reports seen.

Routley - If this is an executive order why has nobody done this?

Bean - I think because this was right before that order.

Currie - Unsure if they had lithium included before and this order has been updated.

**Currie - I motion to also ask our attorney to petition Green Charter Township and Mecosta County Commissioners to join us in our request - all you can do is ask; I think we need to do this as a unity if possible. Everett supports. Motion carries 4-1. Routley no; wants to ask them first.**

Agreement/discussion on sending out email prior to the attorney sending correspondence.

**\*Attorney withdrew from representing BRT and Green Twp, and Mecosta County Commissioners passed a resolution to support Gotion following this meeting\***

Bean - Rather contentious board meeting 3 weeks ago - minutes all published now. A lot of comments made - I made some comments in retrospect; I think my tone should have been different and I stand by them - so recently I was contacted by the Pioneer - letting you know upfront whatever I've said in print I stand by it. I do believe we all feel this way and I don't want to speak for the board - there's a lot of potential either way - just doing our due diligence.

**Public comment:** Cate Arroe - Green Twp has passed a resolution to move forward - on their website discussing things beginning in March and April - so the whole project can still move forward? Bean - Yes it could in Green

Currie - No skin in game - no property (in Green) but only stating their support in the project.

Bean - If they do move forward, I hope they will get ahold of some folks that do this because big business isn't exactly nurturing. Still approaching landowners that they haven't before.

Currie - Any additional land purchased would not be in Ren zone - they would have to pay tax on that property.

Schrivver - Do they have enough acreage in Green?

Garner - From what I gather yes; if it goes through it could be good for the Industrial Park, potential to get an American company in.

Schrivver - Is Green asking their residents? General public answer/not that we have known - Joe Bechaz has asked specifically, but no answer/response.

Schrivver - Getting the word out better? Monday didn't say public meeting. Do we need to advertise? No do-overs on this.

Bean - Roughly 70 chairs at the last meeting, perhaps another 30 people, a max of 120 individuals show interest in what Chuck Thelen called a "nuclear" project - very controversial. With 7800 citizens in the city with the latest census and close to 4000 in ours, you'd think there would be a few more - possibly filling the charter school auditorium; while a lot more there than typical, a bit disappointed in the attendance. Very good dialogue - great conversation.

Vodry - Survey information coming?

Saez - Will go through entering them into a spreadsheet with Bean and hopefully within the next month share results.

Chuck Healey - I appreciate that the board is looking into the national security issues and appreciate the board looking into economic issues - the FBI director wrote about China threat and very well outlined what China does to infiltrate local governments 'killing puppy metaphor.' If not looking for information you're ignorant, and want to publicly advocate for the board.

J. Bechaz - Big advocate for public vote - this is the biggest issue the board has ever had since the annexation - people got to vote on it.

Marybeth Beamer - People do not research, they listen to what friends say and start throwing nasty comments out. Scares me to say that some people will vote and only listen to part of things. At least the ones before us - we voted them in and we have them to research for us. 120 people at a meeting and this is important. I'm for change - went to the meeting with an open mind but such anger and resentment and people joking.

Currie - We have to put some trust in elected officials.

Sue Bean - Unfortunate that some people on FB are not attending meetings and saying very mean things.

Discussion on how to get a larger attendance/word out about meetings and current happenings.

Marybeth - I've heard some businesses in town upset they didn't get a survey - come here and get a survey?

Saez - Send us anything pertaining, or request the city to do their own surveys?

Marybeth - Comfortable with who I voted for - taking a look and doing what's in our best interest. Don't mind change but frustrated with what it has done to the community.



Bean - Each individual here is not afraid of research. I know how much I've done - shy of 1000 pages and 3 full binders. Each one up here has a lot. It's actually one of my hobbies, because I don't like opinions and I look at both sides. The true concept is to argue both sides. Lots of economic advantage and lots of opportunity for the opposite.

Garner - We should be able to say how we feel and have a respectful conversation.

Arroe - Very persuasive - not discerning enough to know the other side. Having the right place at that meeting. One thing hit home - very logical - these jobs are not necessarily new jobs created. Hope everyone pays attention - many of these jobs will be taken from others in the area. Johnson is a perfect example as a small business owner. Higher wages - potential of taking employees. Unemployed people are not the kind of people they will hire here and I wish someone with expertise would address that.

Bean - My profession is auditing manufacturing companies. I have to talk about risk and how they mitigate risk. Quality and management, not employee audited - the number one risk is availability of retention and workforce. 3-5 years to train the average employee.

Bean - What impact will these jobs have on local manufacturers? - still no answer/study

Schrivier - Concerning; claw backs and government amending them. At businesses recently - asked why always shorthanded - since marijuana became legal - not enough people that qualify or pass drug tests. Worry that they will go to the government and ask to bring more people from overseas to work if they can't fulfill requirements/job positions.

Norm McClain - Ice mountain is hiring at 26.50/hr. w/ benefits and still trying to find people.

Marybeth - When did the questions (to Gotion) go out?

Saez/Bean - February 10th most recently, first set in October

Norm McClain - Someone saying that the CCP and any communist government, the government owns all of their businesses so yes direct involvement with communist party - another thing - lack of info should send up red flags. Scares me and boggles my mind how Green Twp can just rush it through and reminds me of a football game when a challenge flag is thrown, so the offense will try to snap the ball through before officials can call for replay; rushing it because it feels as though they are sneaking things through. Very concerned with the amount of land China is buying in the US. Millions of acres of land.

Bean - Recommend some research for anyone - suggest research on what's called Project 2049.

**Bean** - \$750 - I think this is something we need to do - BRT on hold not canceled - still things to discuss with Gotion and the community needs to know that there is low, moderate or severe risk related to the community not just BRT - just because things on hold not willing to stop our journey to discover what we know about the company

**Everett** - would like to see some questions directly answered - they're responding but not answering the questions we ask

**Bean** - first meeting - local bodies came in with FAQ - unsure who asked those questions but they were already drafted - wasn't the public because the public wasn't yet aware

**Currie** - continuous runaround ren zone asked Jeremy from MEDC - why MI ren zone only allows for 15 years why 30? no provision - answer basically was because we can - so Chinese comp a 30-year abatement and Ford a US comp only allowed a 15 year

**Bean** - questions such as that and no explanation, no sit-down face to face

**Currie** - only rep of the company we've heard from - Chuck Thelen - did some shady things prior to the company's announcement - friend bought some land on 18-mile rd. - and then at ren zone he promised a water study and then never produced it but was severely reprimanded for doing so and we're supposed to listen to him and trust

**Bean** - won't be community member holding my hand up for money - if someone tells me a meeting is under NDA, I will leave the meeting because what I know, you should know

**Everett** - Bill quoted saying that were going to have all of the problems but none of the money

**Stanek** - our Fire Department has to have mutual aid, (Bean – no it doesn't) roads fixed and other problems

**Currie** - only other discussion on floor - I would like to see a couple reps from this board talk to Eric on a few detailed concerns so he can really have a feel of the boards concerns

**Eric Williams** - echo that - whenever asked to handle a project - I need a contact person or team that the board has to right at the beginning - Currie supports – suggests Bean and Saez.

**PUBLIC COMMENT:**

**Patti Downey** - happy to see Eric - concerns about conflict of interest. Going on - very concerned about some of the quotes from Mr. Stanek - when this first came out that BRT was out - you said it was because the twp. sent the list of questions and then they didn't want to answer the questions so the twp. was out - but then on "Stanek hopes to mend the relationship between co and twp. - wouldn't speculate for the reason with the change in plans" hopefully after that - still get a chance, on and on. impression that there is such a division in the board - need to show support for your board. better way of phrasing comments. agree totally - call me racist, bigot, xenophobe - don't want Chinese company in my community let alone back door.

I went to Green twp. website - totally different breakdown of shareholders than what we have - source where they broke it down and that source link said – "Cannot access this link unless located in China" - don't sit and say it's not a Chinese company because it is period. Environmental concerns too. I will fight to the end to stop this from coming here. Wish I could stop it from anywhere in the US - I do appreciate most of board members out there trying to find out what residents want instead of what they want personally.

**Saez** – (to Stanek) Did you let your entire board know about Gotion putting on hold before contacting the news?

**Stanek** - I won't answer that type of question

**Aaron** - no training on fire department and too close of proximity to the airport - airplane could fly into the buildings

**Chris Vodry** - along with everyone else - concern I have is if we sell land to anyone we don't investigate thoroughly - and Chinese govt tells them they cannot any longer use that facility - how do we know what they're filling that building with - so for the Twp to sell land they own and not have any idea what is housed in there - could be goodbye to MI

General Conditions of all Stations was satisfactory at this time and available pump performance was good.

We received the evaluation on the Venlo Pump that had failed in January which stated that the pump has major damage and parts are unavailable so we are working on pricing and availability for a new Pump.

On a final note, on our last Inspection on 2-23-2023, University Park Station was not plowed out so the Inspection was not made. It's important to make sure access is made for weekly Inspections and in the case of an Emergency Situation.

## Big Rapids Township Industrial Park Water Plant Monthly Report

February 2023

All operations are normal at the plant. Well 2 is providing ample water for the distribution System. Maintaining a chlorine residual of 0.4 to 0.5 mg/L (parts per million), the water use was 137,000 gallons for 2022 which will need be reported by April 1<sup>st</sup>. Quarterly bacteriological samples were completed in February , 2 samples were taken, 1 at the Roben Hood Airport in the Kitchen, and the other from the well at the plant. We'll be expecting to see a new sample schedule from the sanitarian at Hart, MI at the Type 2 Health Dept office there . Shoveled snow as needed. All other operations are normal at the plant, with electronics, high service pumps, gauges and well 2 providing ample water for the distribution system.

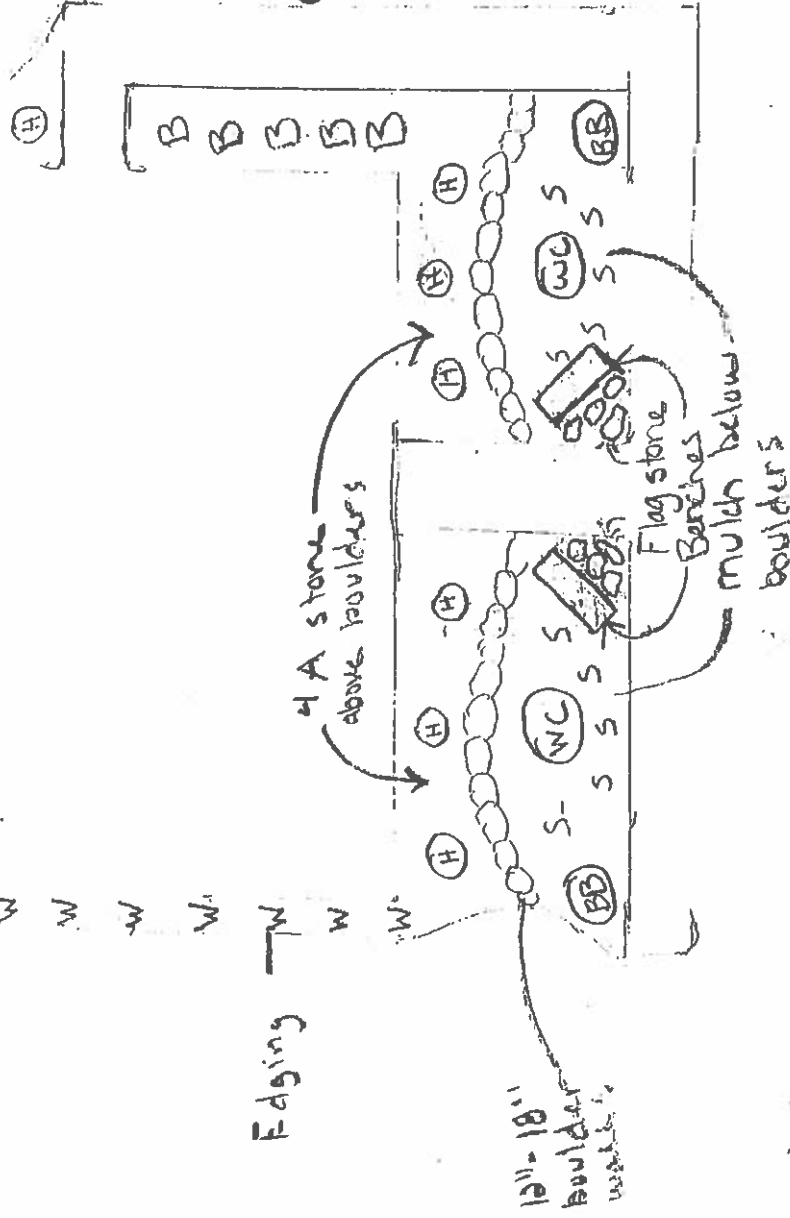

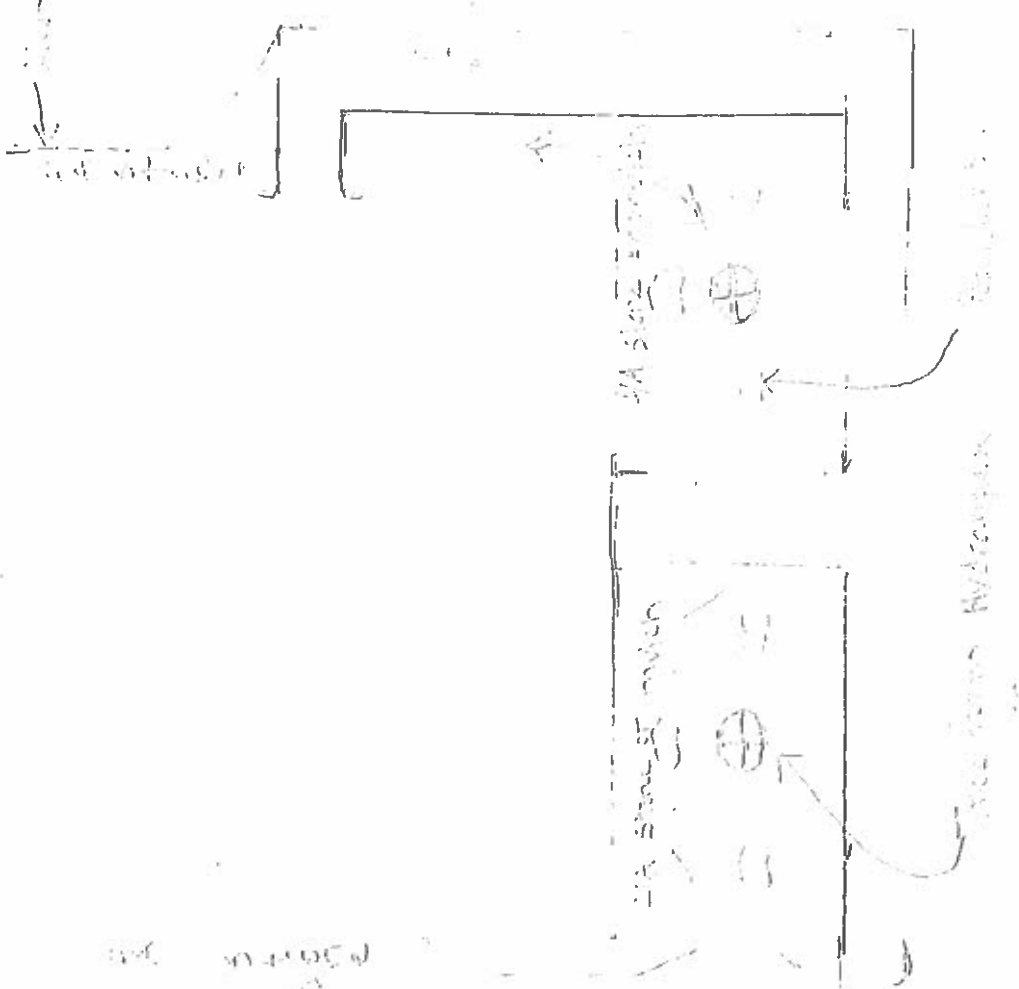

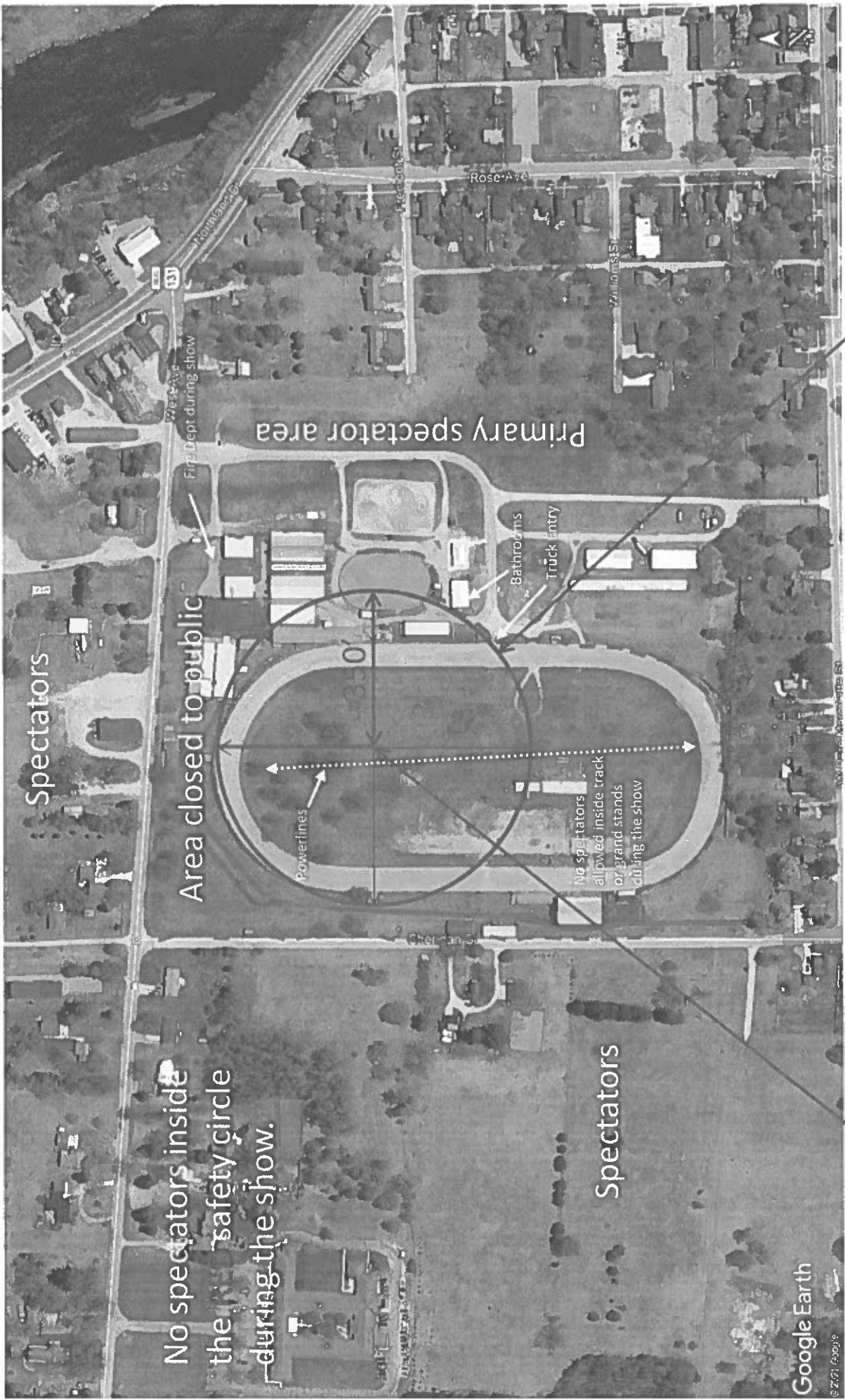
Applications shall be submitted to the legislative body of a city, village or township board. A permit may be issued as a result of official action by the legislative body. A permit shall be valid only for use within the limits of the jurisdiction of the legislative body of a city, village or township board.

1. Type of Permit – check all boxes that may apply to the type of permit needed. You may select several permit types depending on your fireworks display. You may check with your legislative body of a city, village or township board for assistance when making your selection. Please review the following definitions to determine which type of permit to select:
  - Agricultural or Wildlife Fireworks – devices distributed to farmers, ranchers, and growers through a wildlife management program administered by the US Department of Interior or Michigan DNR.
  - Articles Pyrotechnic – 1.4G fireworks for professional use only that is classified as UN0431 or UN0432.
  - Display Fireworks – 1.3G fireworks for professional use only
  - Special Effects Manufactured for Outdoor Pest Control or Agricultural Purposes – devices with a combination of chemical elements or compounds capable of burning independently of the oxygen of the atmosphere and designed and intended to produce an audible, visual, mechanical or thermal effect for pest or animal control.
  - Public Display – a fireworks display that is open to all persons for viewing.
  - Private Display – a fireworks display that is not open to the general public for viewing.
2. Name of applicant – list the name of the applicant. The applicant may be a person representing an organization, group, firm or corporation, or self. If the applicant is also the operator, enter the same name in the operator's section.
3. Address of applicant – complete the address of the applicant; include the street address, city, state and zip code.
4. Name of person or resident agent representing corporation, LLC, DBA or other – list the name of the person or resident agent that represents the corporation, LLC, DBA or other.
5. Address of person or resident agent that represents the corporation, LLC, DBA or other – list the address of the person or resident agent representing the corporation, LLC, DBA or other.
6. Non-resident applicant – list the name of the non-resident applicant. A non-resident applicant shall appoint a Michigan attorney or Michigan resident agent in writing to be the applicant's legal representative upon whom all service of process in any action or proceeding may be served.
7. Name of pyrotechnic operator – list the name of the pyrotechnic operator. The pyrotechnic operator is the person in charge of the display. The legislative body of a city, village or township board shall rule on the competency and qualifications of the operator before granting a permit and may require an affidavit from the applicant as to the operator's experience, former pyrotechnic accidents, criminal record, sobriety, etc.
8. Address of pyrotechnic operator – list the address of the pyrotechnic operator; include the street address, city, state and zip code.
9. Age of the pyrotechnic operator – list the age of the pyrotechnic operator; the operator must be 18 years of age or older.
10. Name of assistant – list the name of the assistant to the pyrotechnic operator;
11. Address of assistant – list the address of the assistant; include the street address, city, state and zip code. If there is more than one assistant, please list additional assistants on a separate sheet and include the address and age of those additional assistants.
12. Age of assistant – list the age of the assistant to the pyrotechnic operator; the assistant must be 18 years or older.
13. Name of other assistant – list the name of other assistant to the pyrotechnic operator.
14. Age of other assistant – list the age of the assistant to the pyrotechnic operator; the assistant must be 18 years or older.
15. Exact location of proposed display – list the address of the exact location of the proposed fireworks display.
16. Date of proposed display – indicate the date of the proposed fireworks display; only one display date can be used per application.
17. Time of proposed display – indicate the time of the proposed fireworks display.
18. Manner and place of storage - indicate the manner and place of storage within the legislative body of a city, village or township board of fireworks that are ready for display, just prior to the display in the area of exhibition. The legislative body of a city, village or township board shall obtain approval from the local fire authorities of the manner and place of storage before any permit is issued.

19. Amount of bond or insurance - the issuing legislative body of a city, village or township board shall set the amount of and proof of bond or insurance for the protection of the public to satisfy claims for damages to property or personal injuries arising out of any act or omission on the part of the person, firm or corporation, or any agent or employee of the applicant. The applicant shall assure the bond or insurance required is provided.
20. Name of bonding corporation or insurance company – provide the name of the bonding corporation or insurance company for which the bond was issued through.

23. The application is valid for the calendar year in which the application was received and permit was issued.
24. Permit fees shall be established by the legislative body of a city, village or township board and shall be submitted to and retained by legislative body of a city, village or township board.
25. Permitting will be in compliance with the Michigan Fireworks Safety Act, PA 256 of 2011, MCL 28.466, Section 16.
26. **Mail the application to the legislative body of a city, village or township board within the location jurisdiction of the display.** DO NOT mail the application to the Bureau of Fire Services (BFS). If mailed to the BFS, it will be returned to the sender.
